## The Pupil Premium Cohort







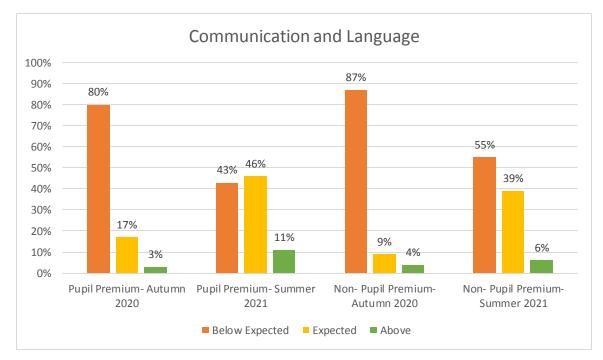


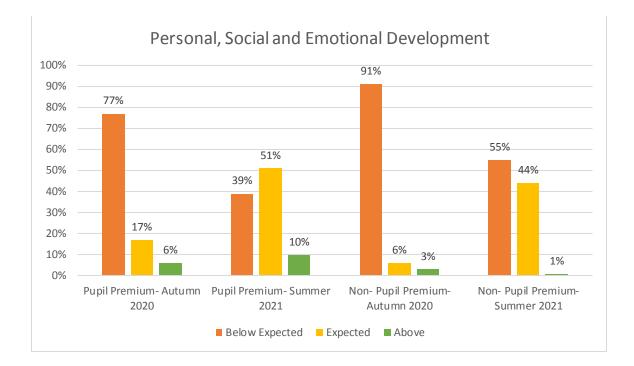
The average attendance of pupil premium children is 63.9%. This is broadly in line with the overall attendance figure of the year which is 64.81%

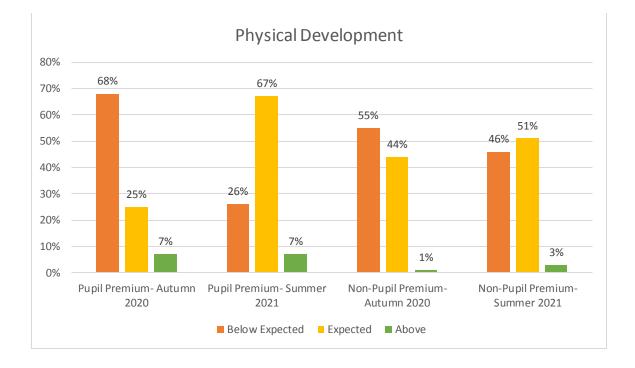
# Attainment and Progress of Pupil Premium Children in the 2020-2021 cohort.

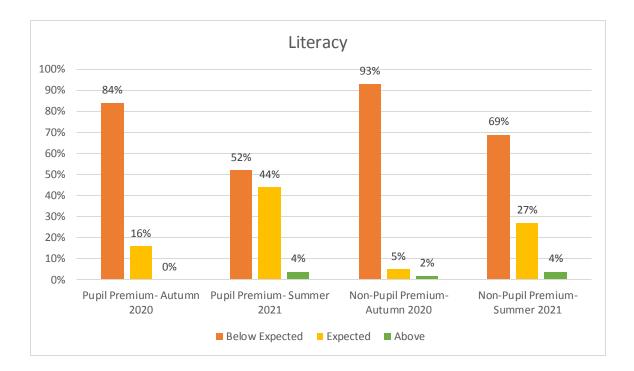

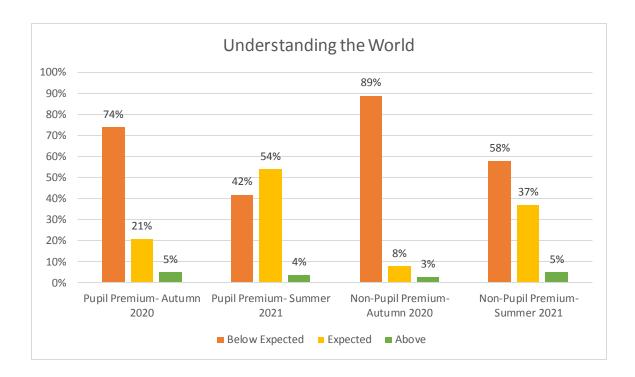


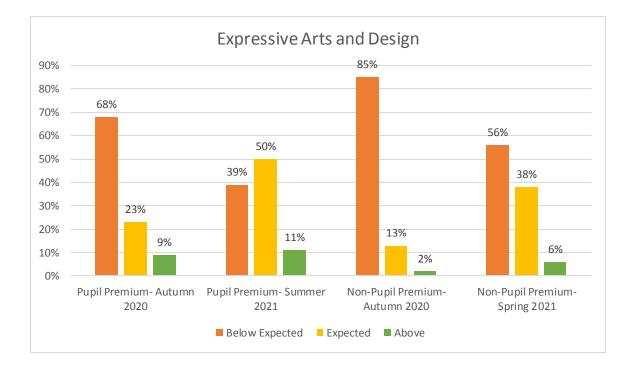












## Analysis

This is the largest group of pupil premium children we have had at Lea in recent years. A high proportion of these children started at Lea as two year olds and many of those that achieved expected and above attainment are those who have been at Lea for some time.

The pupil premium children achieve best in:

- Physical Development
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Expressive Arts and Design

It is worth noting that pupil premium children achieved well in Expressive Arts and Design. The children who started at 2 years of age were part of a pupil premium funded music project that had to unfortunately end due to COVID-19. This project's impact is apparent in these children.

The pupil premium children made the best progress in the prime areas:

- Physical Development (32% of children achieved age related expectations on entry, on exit 74% of children achieved age related expectations.)
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development (23% of children achieved age related expectations on entry, on exit 61% of children achieved age related expectations.)
- Communication and Language (20% of children achieved age related expectations on entry, on exit 57% of children achieved age related expectations.)

### **Use of Pupil Premium Funding**

The early years pupil premium funding is allocated through the budget sheet and is based on estimated numbers. The figure is adjusted each term when actual numbers are determined. As a result of this we only know our final pupil premium income at the end of the summer holidays, this makes it very challenging to plan the spending. This year the numbers rose term on term, with some children only appearing on the pupil premium list in the final term of the academic year. The following figures are based on the funding following adjustments.

COVID-19 disrupted some of the planned pupil premium spending and the spending was partially reactive to COVID-19, with resource packs going out to families as well as investment in staff training and equipment that would support the learning and development of pupil premium children in school (particularly with regards to physical development.) The number of pupil premium children also rose term on term- with a sharp spike at the end of the academic year.

## Priorities for Next Academic Year.

- Improve attendance for all pupil premium children.
- A focus on attainment in Mathematical Development and Literacy.
