Pupil Premium Report 2018-2019

Our approach to supporting pupil premium children has changed through the course of the year following a restructure in which the post of 'Narrowing the Achievement Gap Co-Ordinator' was deleted. All staff now hold collective responsibility for ensuring the progress of Pupil Premium children.

Action Plan for Pupil Premium Children Based on Outcomes and Progress of Previous Cohort

- 1. Improve attendance for all pupil premium children.
- 2. Increase the proportion of children achieving outstanding progress in Communication and Language through offering opportunities to develop language through song.
- 3. Strengthen further all adults' understanding of their collective responsibility to overcome barriers and ensure the disadvantaged children continue to make rapid progress.

Use of Pupil Premium Funding








Attendance at Nursery




Progress Related to Starting Points for Children Who Receive Early Years Pupil Premium When Compared to Children Who Do Not Receive Early Years Pupil Premium.



















Analysis

The small cohort of pupil premium children reduces the statistical relevance of this data (11.)

A higher proportion of pupil premium children make outstanding progress in

- Physical Development (45% vs. 24%)
- Literacy (32% vs. 25%)
- Mathematics (52% vs. 29%)

In all areas except 'Physical Development' a lower proportion of Pupil Premium children achieve below expected progress.

The achievement gap between the number of pupil premium and non-pupil premium children making outstanding progress is as follows:

- Personal Social and Emotional Development (25%)
- Communication and Language (4%)
- Understanding the World (6%)
- Expressive Arts and Design (4%)

Priorities for Next Academic Year.

- Improve attendance for all pupil premium children.
- Increase the proportion of children achieving outstanding progress in Communication and Language.
